ROADS' REPORT - Rick Applegate

Thank you to Chuck Hopkins for continuing to share his knowledge and help on our roads. He has made this transition easy and effective. Additionally, thank you to Mike Holden, Dick Johnson and several other residents who have helped care for our roads and roadside trimmings.

Roadwork related to dust control and snow plowing is directly affected by Mother Nature. We have been working with a better gravel mix which has helped with any washouts created by a hard rain. Our goal is to do the best we can with the resources available.

Compost – Our compost area is filling up fast. No vendors are allowed dumping privileges on our site. Limbs or logs must be 6" in diameter or smaller. Please contact me if you see someone abusing our compost site.

Since taking over the roads, there is one obstacle which continually resurfaces: residents, their guests, vendors, or contractors are going way too fast. PLEASE SLOW DOWN!

Hello fellow Lakers as I wanted to give just a brief update and still include information from summer lakes update.

- 1. Weed spraying has been completed for this year successfully managing a balance between weeds for boaters / swimmers and fish.
- 2. Sonar application for perch was a success where milfoil was impacted positively with no nutrient load requiring multiple copper sulfate treatments.
- 3. Little Crystal project has been a success in that purchase of boat and motor to agitate muck and accelerate break down is working. Thanks to Chad Fish, Mike Holden, and Rick Applegate.

- 4. Perch Lake hydrosweep needed some repairs this year, as have two of the cutter boats. We are down to one cutter boat on Crystal at the moment while the Perch Lake cutter boat is now running well. Thanks go out to Chuck Hopkins, Ed Lewis, and Tom Lieblein.
- 5. Water level for this year did go down on both lakes, but it remained higher than last year. Some minor weir repairs were done by Rick Applegate to ensure we keep the water we are supposed to have.
- 6. The Board wants to stress the need for Lake Donation participation. Meaning no lot spraying or use of foundation equipment unless you have made the initial \$100 contribution and hopefully a \$25 fish management donation.
- 7. 9,000 fat head minnows were added to Crystal and Perch Lakes on September 6th to continue our bottom-up approach to fish management.
- 8. The proposed lakes budget for 2019 will remain at \$19,000. \$14,000 allocated for weed management, \$2,000 for equipment maintenance, and \$3,000 for fish stocking as needed.
- 9. Please do not feed the ducks and swans.
- 10. Early September water testing samples came back with our lakes looking great, once again. Please keep up all of your good work to maintain our environment.
- 11. If you have not donated to the Lake Foundation, there is still plenty of time to do so. You may contact me at 734-320-4258, and I will help make your contribution.

LAKE REFLECTIONS - Gedy Love

Dr. Gedy Love has graciously volunteered to provide a historical narrative of our lake community. Dr. Love has lived on the lake for 67 years; she is a former Board member and created the Lake Preservation Foundation. As an advocate for protecting the purity of our lakes, Gedy spearheaded environmental research that has benefited generations of lake residents, family, and friends. Dr Love has an undergraduate degree from MSU and a PhD from U of M.

My love affair with our lakes started at a very early age.

In 1951, my parents and I fled Buenos Aires, Argentina, as the socialist uprisings became more violent. My parents had moved to Buenos Aires to be with my grandfather in 1950, so they didn't stay long. We came to Crystal Lake to stay with my grandmother and step-grandfather, Gladys (Bailey) and Larry Anderson, Lot 26, until my parents could find work. I was under a year old when I first saw Crystal Lake and my new brother was born soon after (1952).

As a child, I discovered the great fun of rolling down Grandma's hill toward the lake. This was a time before we had to worry about the gifts left by the geese. I would roll over and over again down her hill.

My mother taught me how to swim with my life jacket on. It was bright orange and was scratchy! My brother soon learned to swim with his life jacket too. We graduated out of our life jackets when we were

more capable and older.

There were mushy places to walk in the lake, but Grandma had pea-gravel dumped in front of her house so the lake bottom would be firm. (Today we can't do this without a permit from the DEQ.) We had to stay away from the neighbor's beach because he dumped his garbage in the lake. (Subsequent neighbors have fished out all kinds of junk, including old batteries.)

We learned that if we stood still for a while, the minnows would nibble our legs and toes. The bigger fish made fish nests. These nesting fish were fun to watch as they swam in circles around their nests. We were to leave these nests alone.

Grandma always said that Crystal Lake is THE place to live. That is why she moved here from Jackson. She said they called it Crystal Lake because the water was crystal clear. Then she would point into the lake and say, "See, you can see right down to the bottom—crystal clear!"

Grandpa Larry took us fishing on the dock and sometimes in the row boat. We had to wear our life jackets in the boat. He put the worms on the hooks and he took the fish off the hooks. Grandpa would clean the fish in the basement. He has a special sink for this. I couldn't watch! Grandma would fry up the fish and it was delicious! We never went hungry at Grandma's and Grandpa's house.

We would go for long (for young legs) walks along Crystal Lake Drive. At that time, they put oil on the roads to keep the dust down. The roads were as hard as asphalt in most places. We couldn't walk on the roads right after the treatment because it smelled badly and there were puddles of oil. It didn't smell too good on hot days either! Sometimes they oiled the road twice a season. This practice was outlawed a long time ago. It is remarkable how Mother Nature has cleaned up our roads!

This is my first installment. I hope you enjoyed sharing with me. In future articles, I will discuss the past picnics, adventures on the lakes, Lake Preservation, and many other topics.
